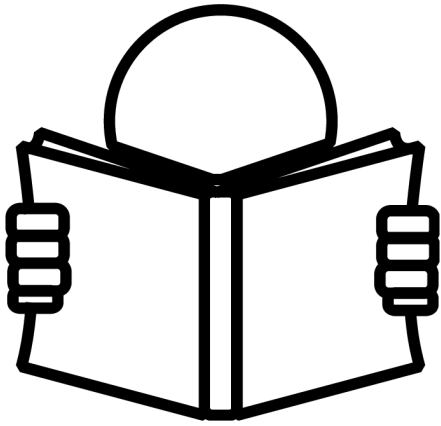

Reading

Reading every day will make a huge difference to your child's progress.

Reading the same book several times will help them to become fluent readers and start to use expression.

The QR codes on the next page will link to a video to practise the sounds we have been learning at school.

How to help your child with reading

Try and make time every day to read to your child. You could read an adventure story or a non-fiction book about cars or animals. When you read to your child, they get to experience adventurous language and ideas that they might not have found in their reading books.

Read lots of different types of books. If they have really enjoyed a book, please send it in to school so that they can share it with the class.

When listening to your child read, encourage them to sound out words they are stuck on. At school, we use the phrase 'Special friends, Fred talk, read the word'

Ask them questions about the story. Try to ask open questions that begin with 'how' or 'why' (Why did she do that? How is he going to solve this problem?) Talk about what is happening in a picture, what the characters might be thinking, or what might happen next.

Maths



Logging in to Numbots (<https://play.numbots.com>) will support quick recall of number facts and is also a fun game. If your child could login for 10 minutes twice a week, this would really help them to answer questions quickly in class.

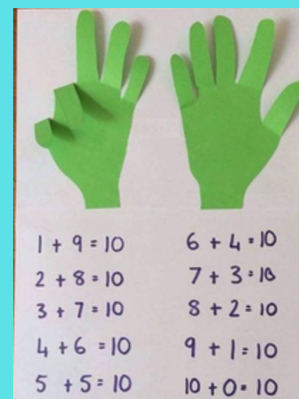
How to help your child with maths

Count forwards and backwards, starting from different numbers

Practise writing numbers making sure they are the correct way around.

Point out the maths in everyday life. Include your child in activities involving numbers and measuring, such as shopping and cooking.

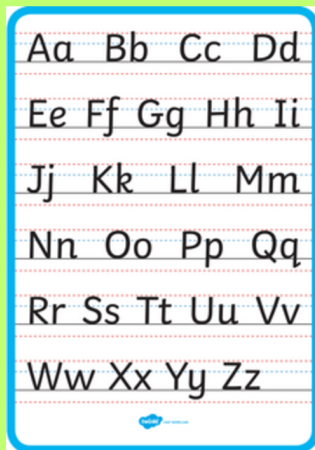
Learn number bonds to 10 using their hands



$1 + 9 = 10$	$6 + 4 = 10$
$2 + 8 = 10$	$7 + 3 = 10$
$3 + 7 = 10$	$8 + 2 = 10$
$4 + 6 = 10$	$9 + 1 = 10$
$5 + 5 = 10$	$10 + 0 = 10$
